Key messages from Europe


To succeed, green list has:



Natura 2000

EU-wide network of nature conservation areas

First worldwilde network of protected areas

- 25 000 sites, covering around 20 % of the total land area of the EU
- Around 800 000 km2 + 100 000 km2 of marine environment

Spain, Italy and France cover four of Western Europe's five major biogeographic regions
