MESSAGE OF THE VTH IUCN WORLD PARKS CONGRESS TO THE CONVENTION ON BIOLOGICAL DIVERSITY

September 2003 The Vth IUCN World Parks Congress met on 8-17 September in Durban, South Africa, bringing together some 3000 delegates, representing a diverse range of countries, interests and experience in protected areas. 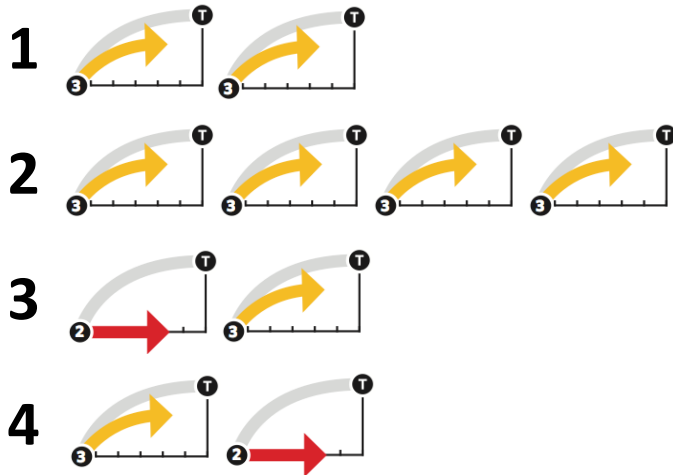

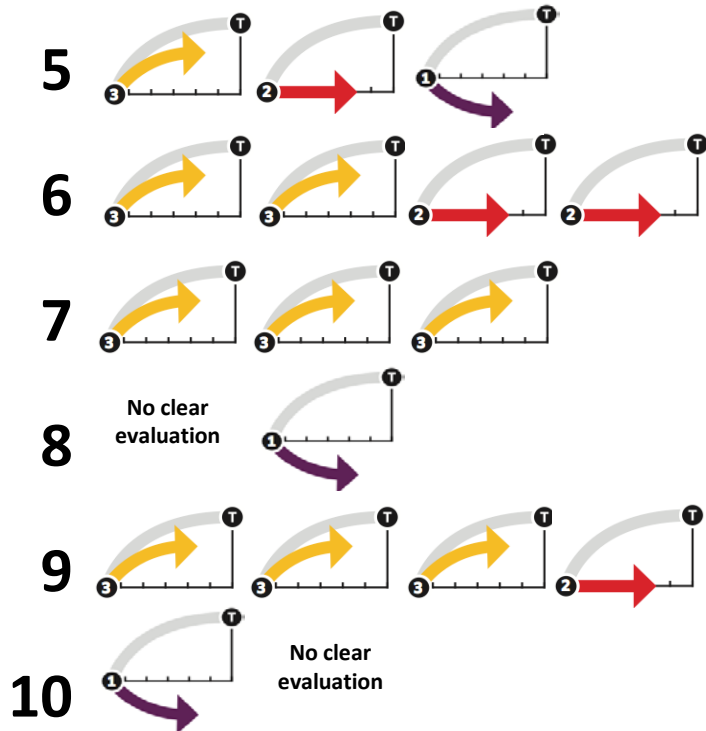

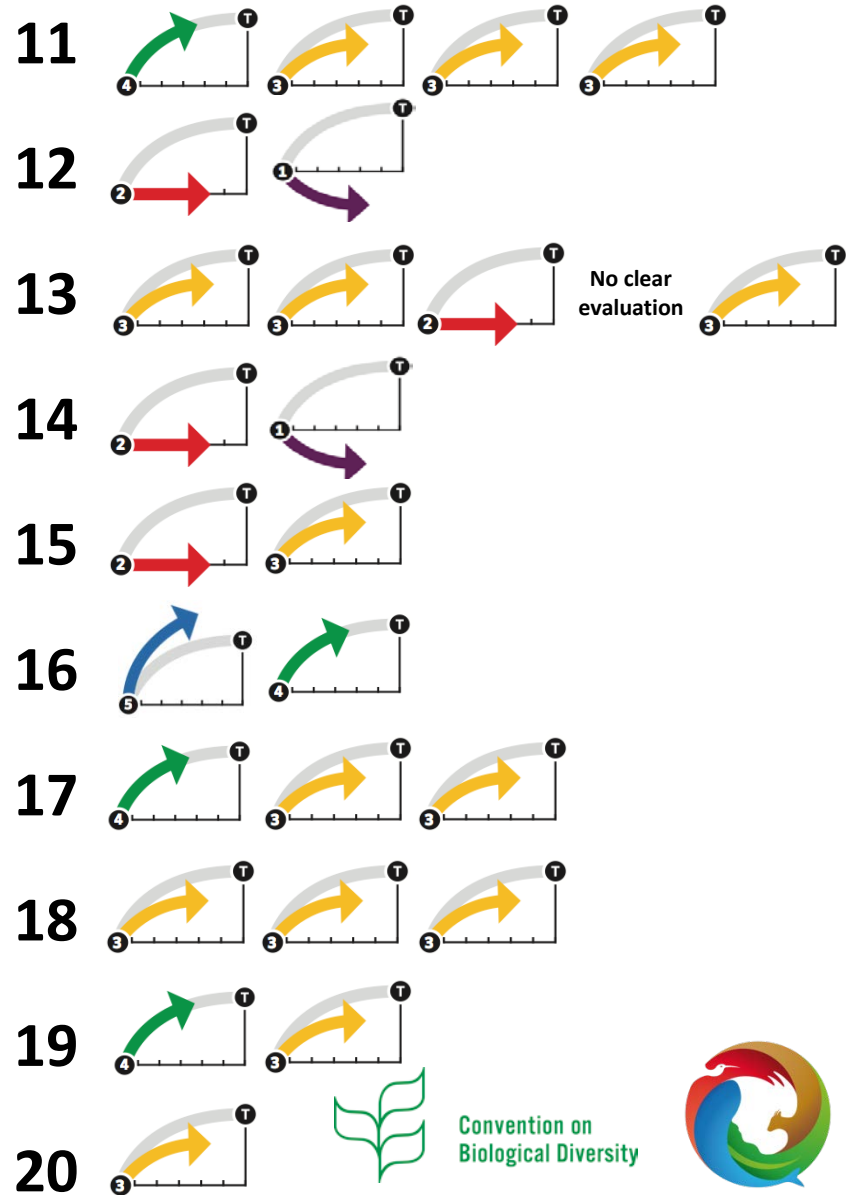

Areas within national jurisdiction (0-200 nautical miles)

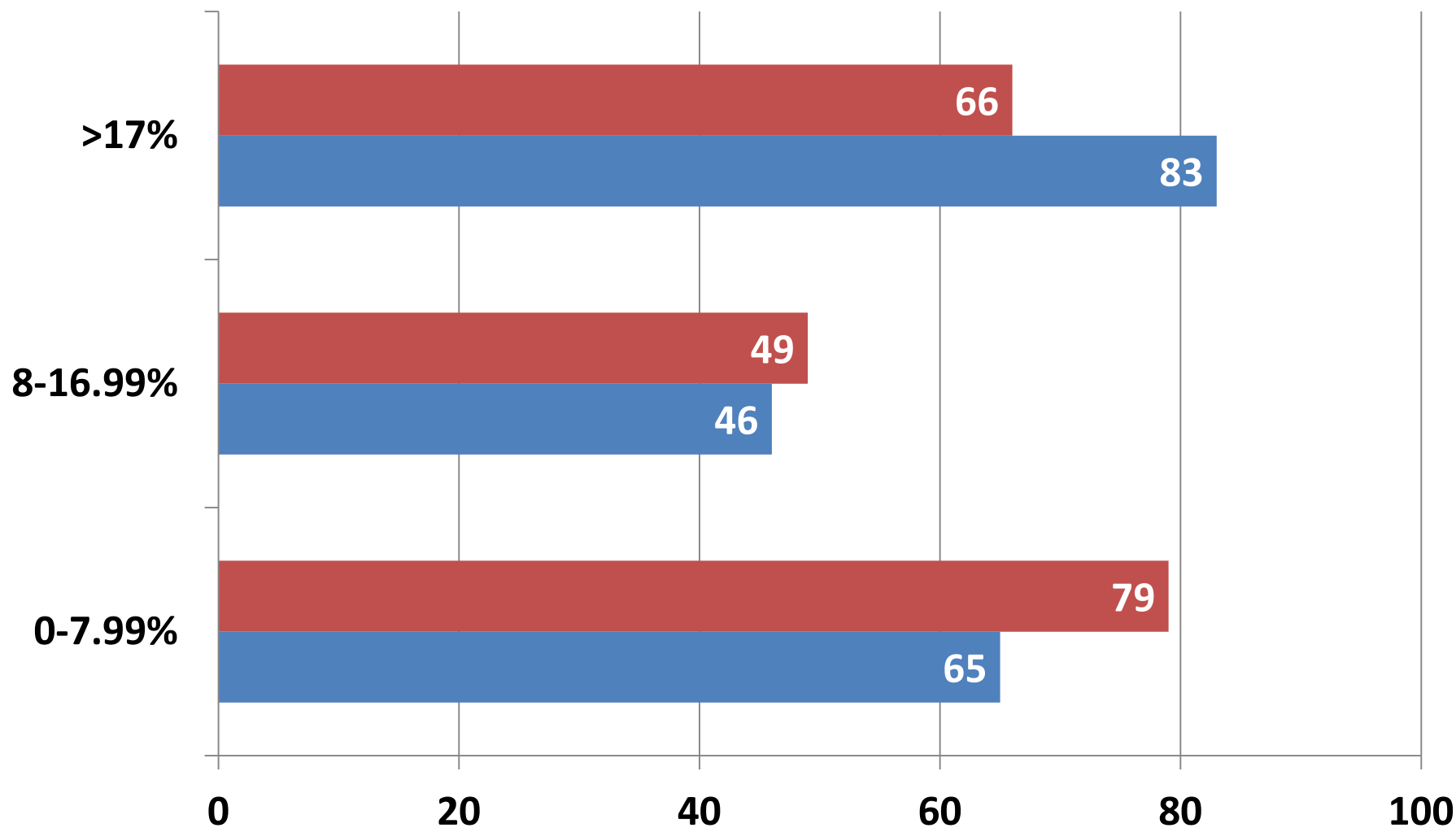

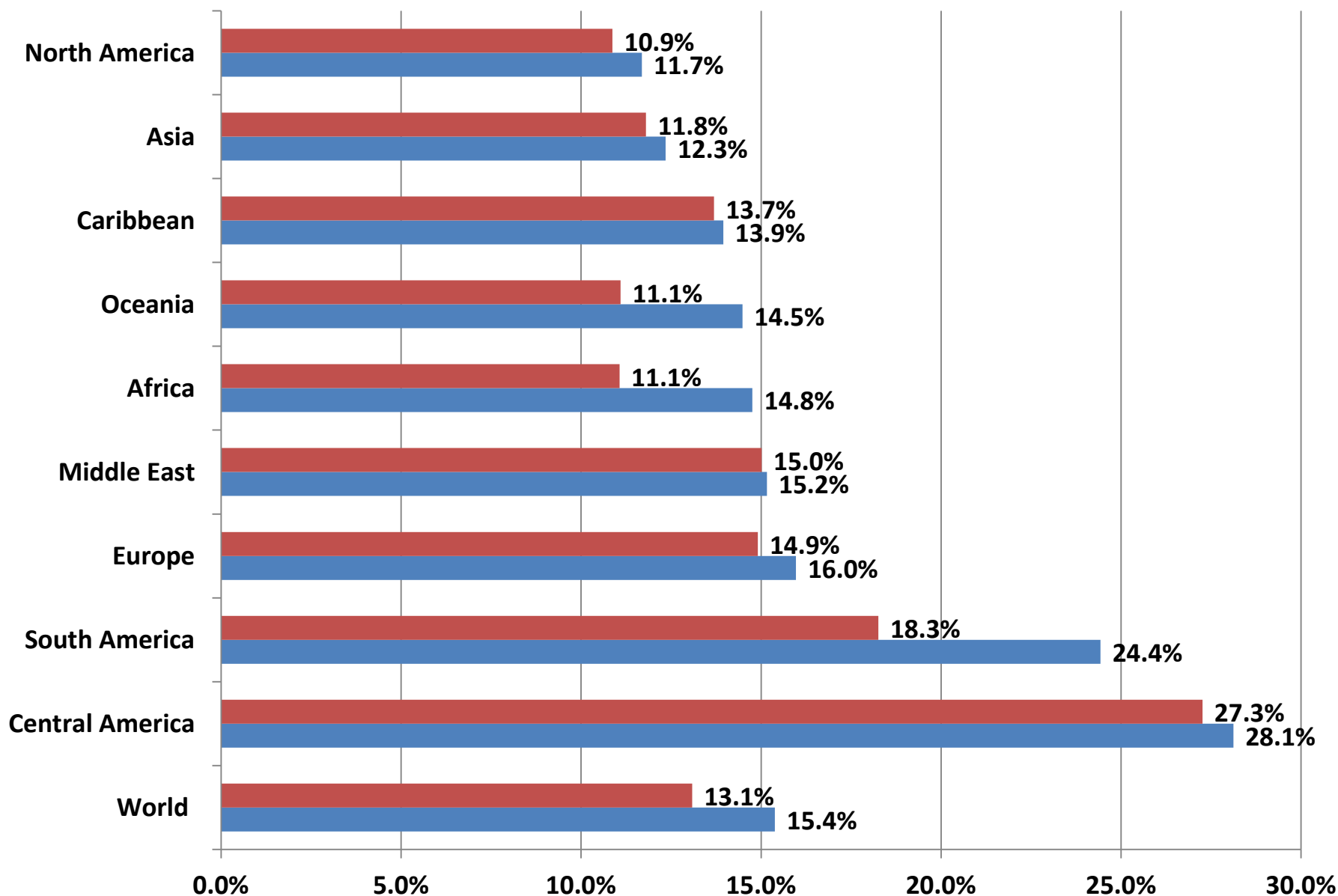


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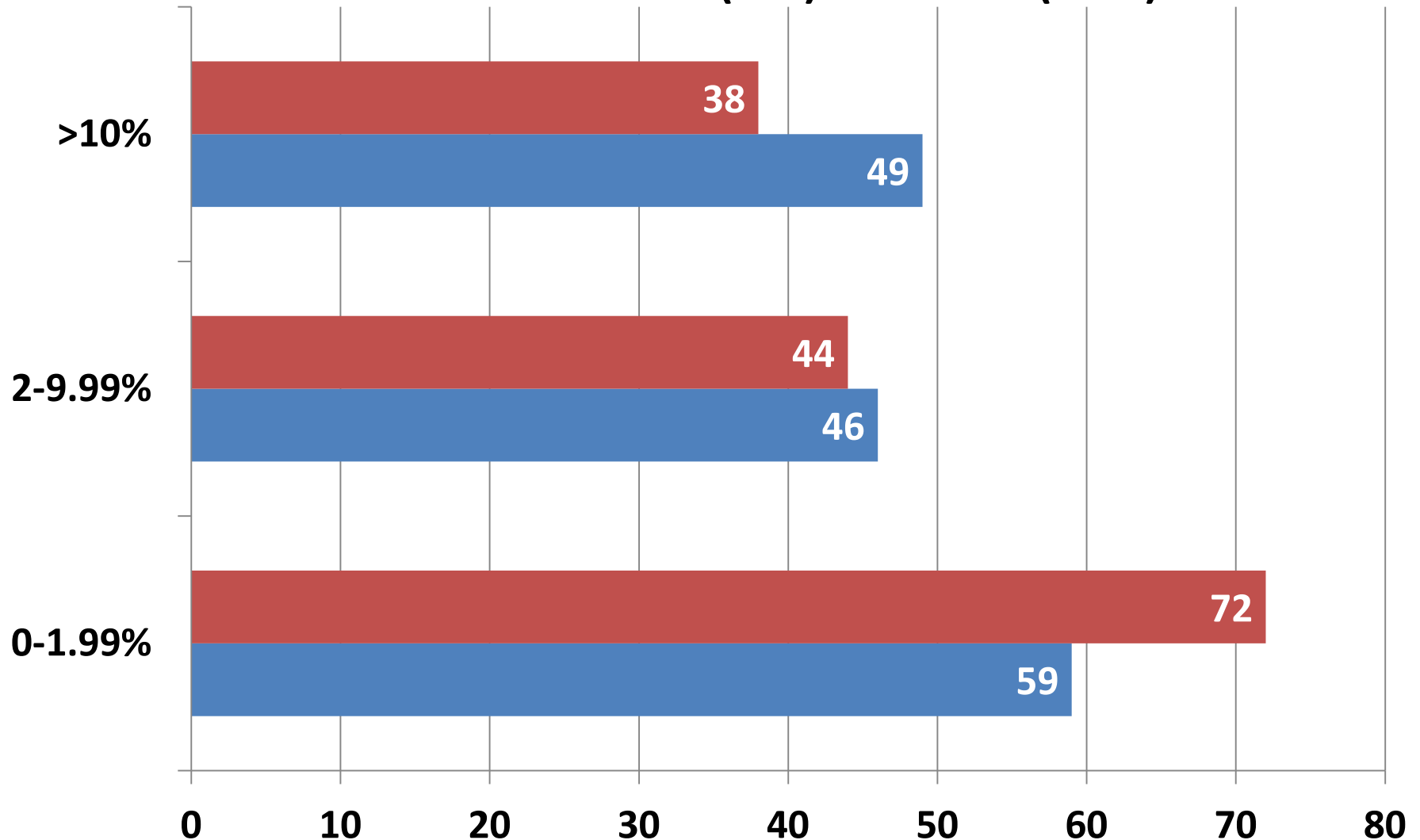
Number of CBD Parties at different levels of protection (percentage) for terrestrial areas in 2004 (red) and 2014 (blue)



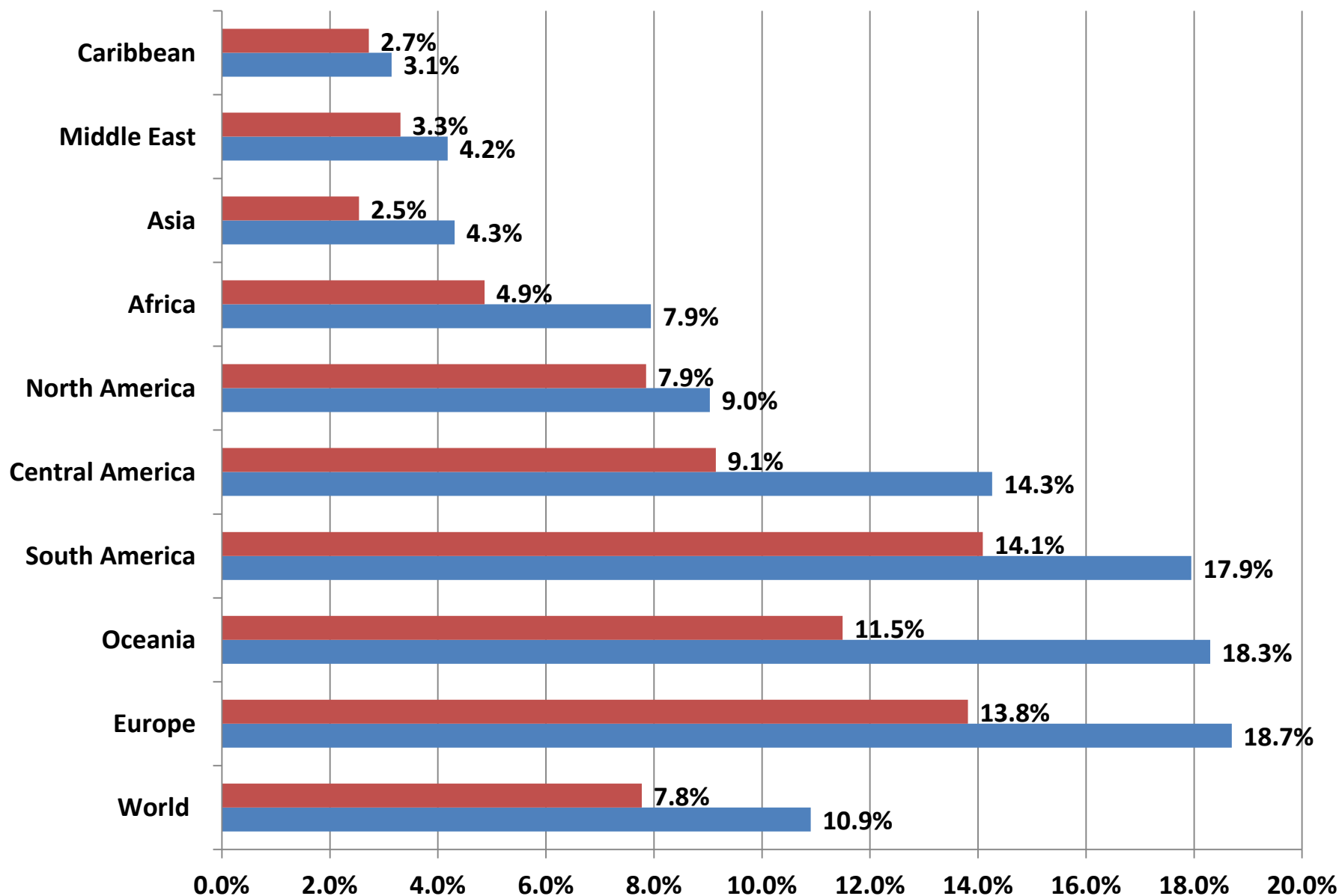
Percentage of terrestrial area protected in 2004 (red) and 2014 (blue)



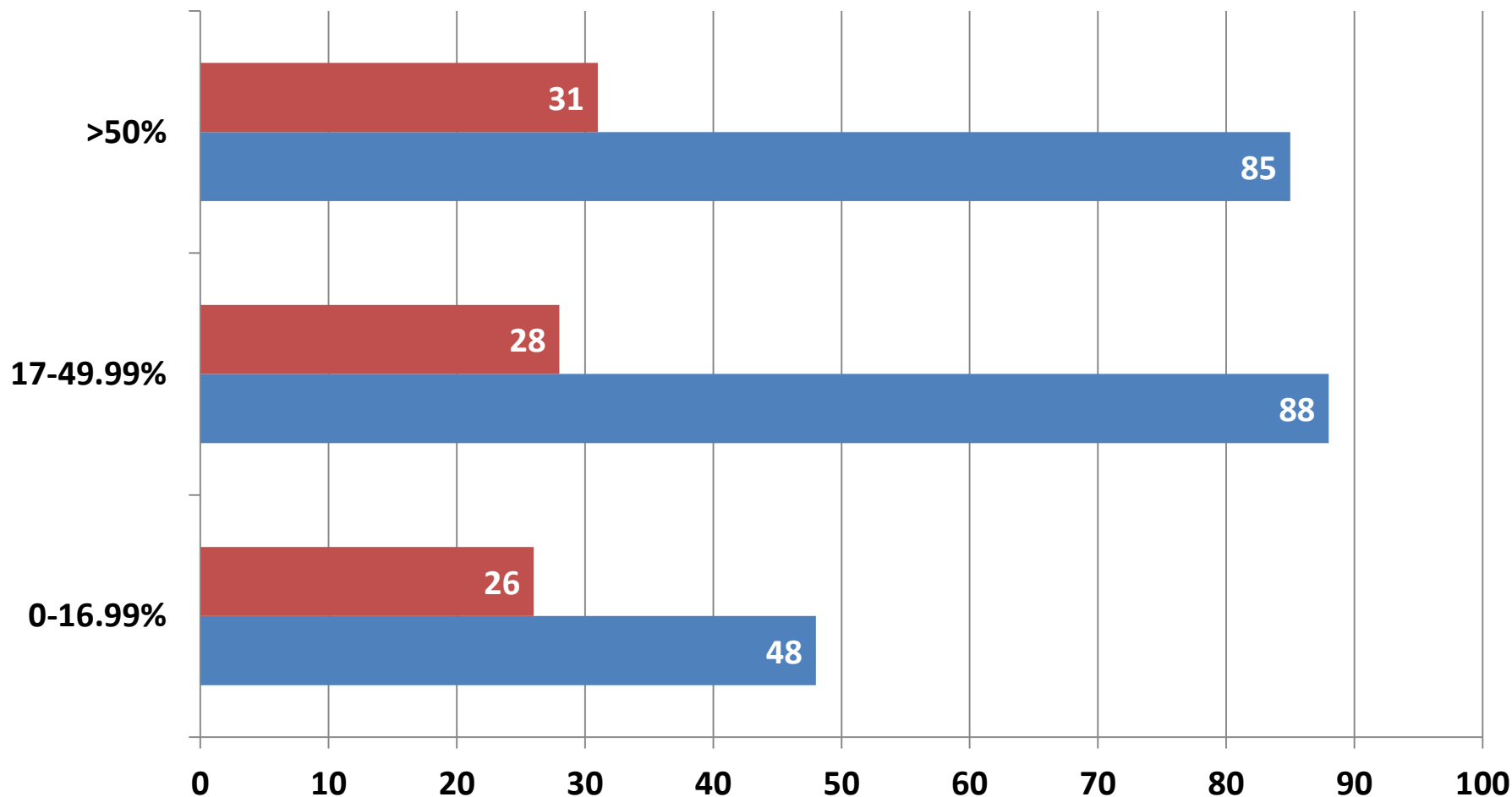
Number of CBD Parties at different levels of protection (percentage) for territorial seas up to 12 nauticle miles in 2004 (red) and 2014 (blue)



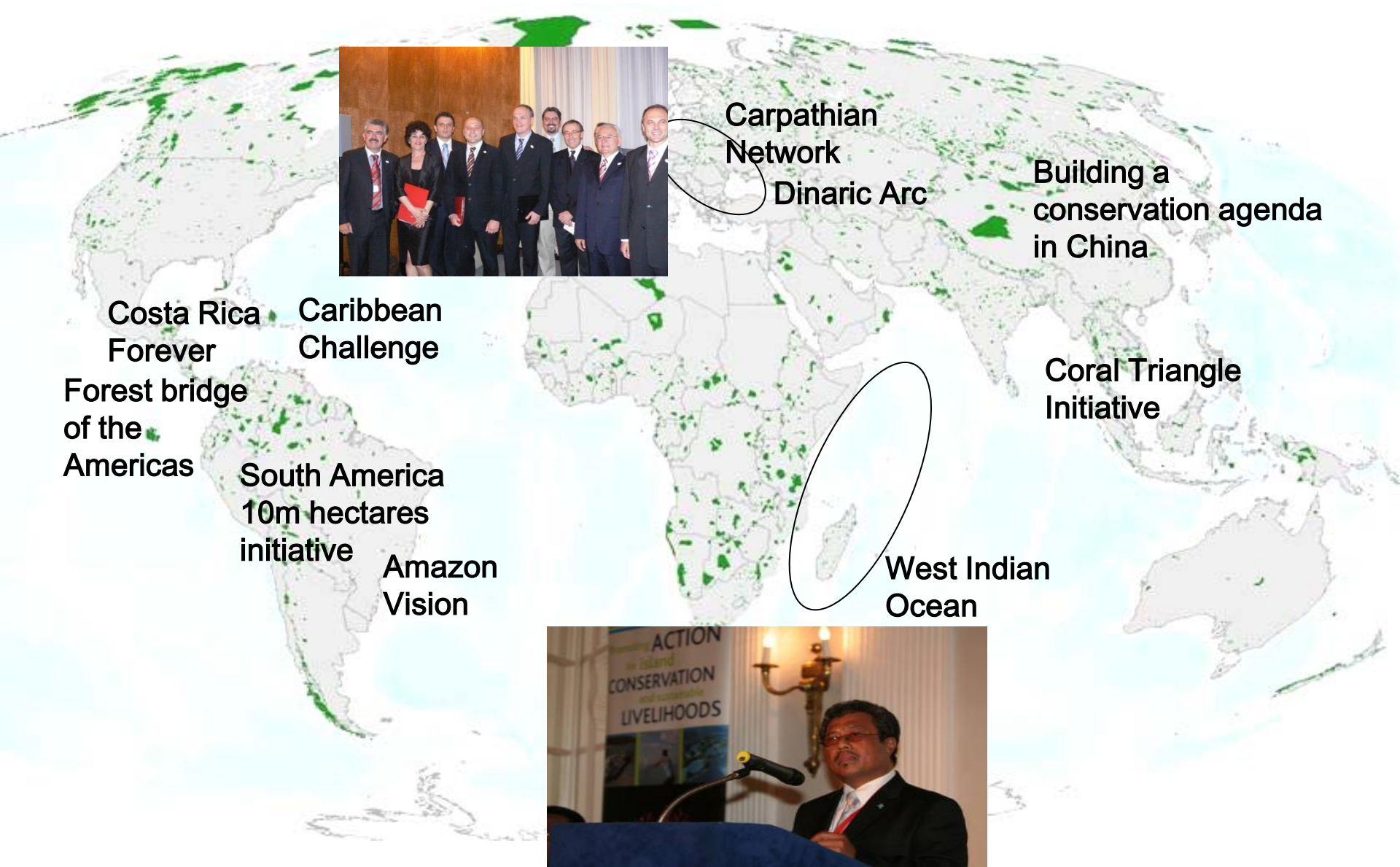
Percentage of territorial seas protected in 2004 (red) and 2014 (blue)



The number of countries with different levels of protected area coverage for Alliance for Zero Extinction Sites (red) and Important Bird and Biodiversity Areas (blue)

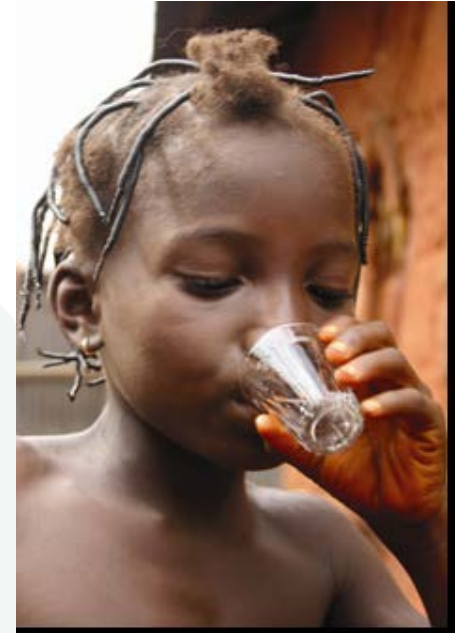
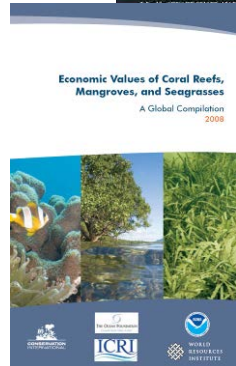
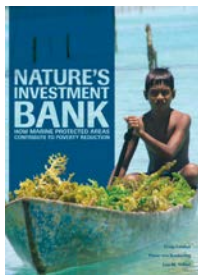
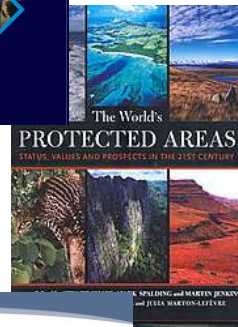
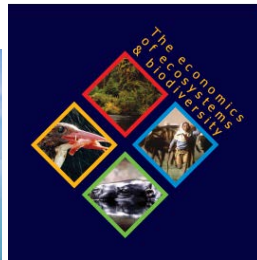
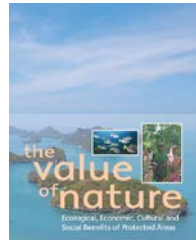
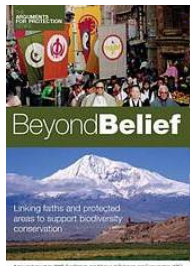

There is no shortage of guides, case studies, methodologies and other materials to help implement the Programme of Work on Protected Areas. In fact, there is so much material that it can be overwhelming to read everything. The Secretariat has developed concise learning modules for each goal of the Programme of Work. These modules are like short courses which take approximately an hour each, providing an overview of key terms, concepts, resources and approaches.

To access the on-line courses as well as exercises, additional learning materials, and discussion forums, click the 'Take the course' button. You will be redirected to the conservation training site hosting the course where you can create a profile.

Introductory Module

This module provides an introduction to the history, structure and elements of the Programme of Work on Protected Areas.

Module 1: Protected area network design

This module covers aspects related to the design of a national protected area network (PoWPA Goal 1.1), including instructions on how to conduct an ecological gap assessment.

Module 2: Protected area integration

This module covers aspects related to integrating protected areas into the wider landscape, seascape and strategies (PoWPA Goal 1.2), including the development of conservation corridors, and mainstreaming protected areas into other sectors.

Module 3: Transboundary protected areas and regional networks

This module covers aspects related to transboundary protected areas and regional networks (PoWPA Goal 1.3), including the establishment, planning, management and assessment of transboundary areas.

Module 4: Management planning

This module covers aspects related to management planning (PoWPA Goal 1.4), including instructions on how to integrate climate change adaptation into management plans.

Module 5: Protected area threats

This module covers aspects related to protected area threats (PoWPA Goal 1.5), including the prevention and mitigation of invasive species, and conducting threat assessments.

Module 6: Protected area governance, equity and benefit sharing

This module covers aspects related to governance, equity and benefit sharing (PoWPA Goal 2.1), including best practices for planning.

Module 7: Protected area participation

This module covers aspects related to protected area participation (PoWPA Goal 2.2), including participation of indigenous and local communities.

Welcome to this Module on Protected Area Networks and Ecological Gap Assessments.

Comprehensive and representative protected area networks are generally regarded as the cornerstone of any conservation strategy.

However, many protected area systems around the world have been developed in an ad hoc manner. The result is that protected area networks typically over represent certain ecosystems, such as mountains and deserts, and under represent other areas, such as grasslands, riparian areas and lowland forests.

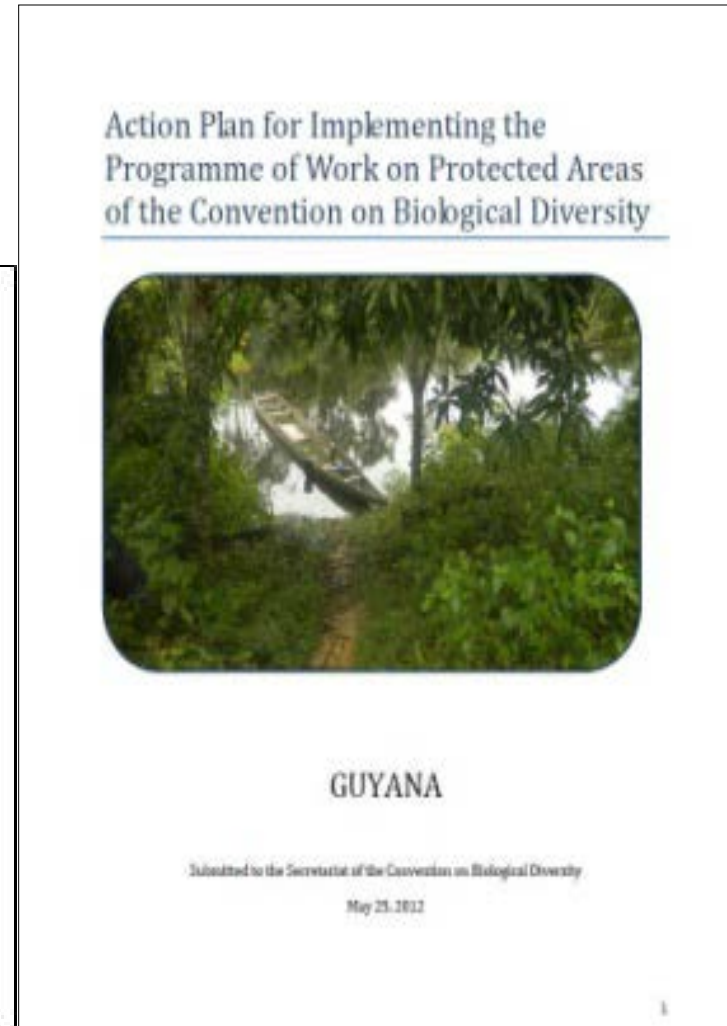
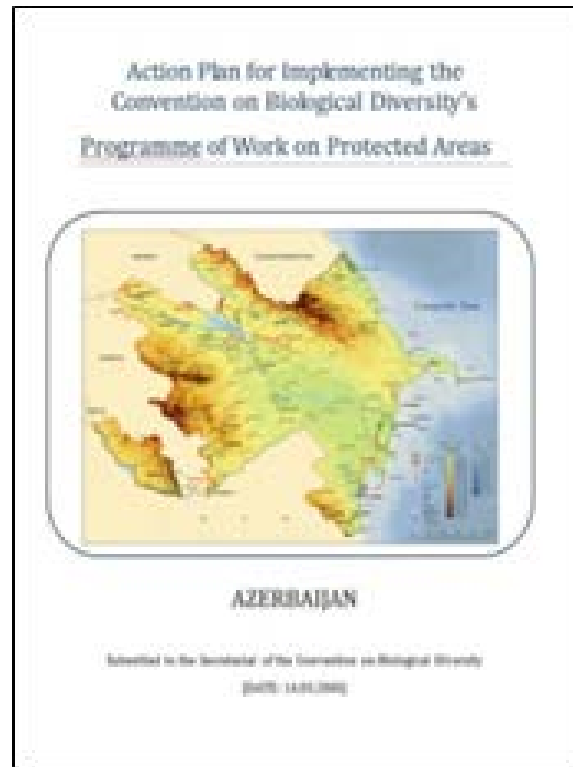
