



Community Perspective on the Haleakala National Park

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Maui Map

Natural scene resources derive from 3D aerial and satellite imagery, NOAA land cover data, and processed 2D satellite imagery and a 3D elevation model using 20 contours.

Vertical exaggeration is used. Topographic elevations are larger than contemporary road elevations in the background and are not to scale.

The base of Haleakalā, which comprises all of east Maui, spans 22 miles (35 km) from La Perouse Bay in the west, 20 miles (32 km) to the east, and 10 miles (16 km) to the south. The island of Maui is 10 miles (16 km) long and 10 miles (16 km) wide.

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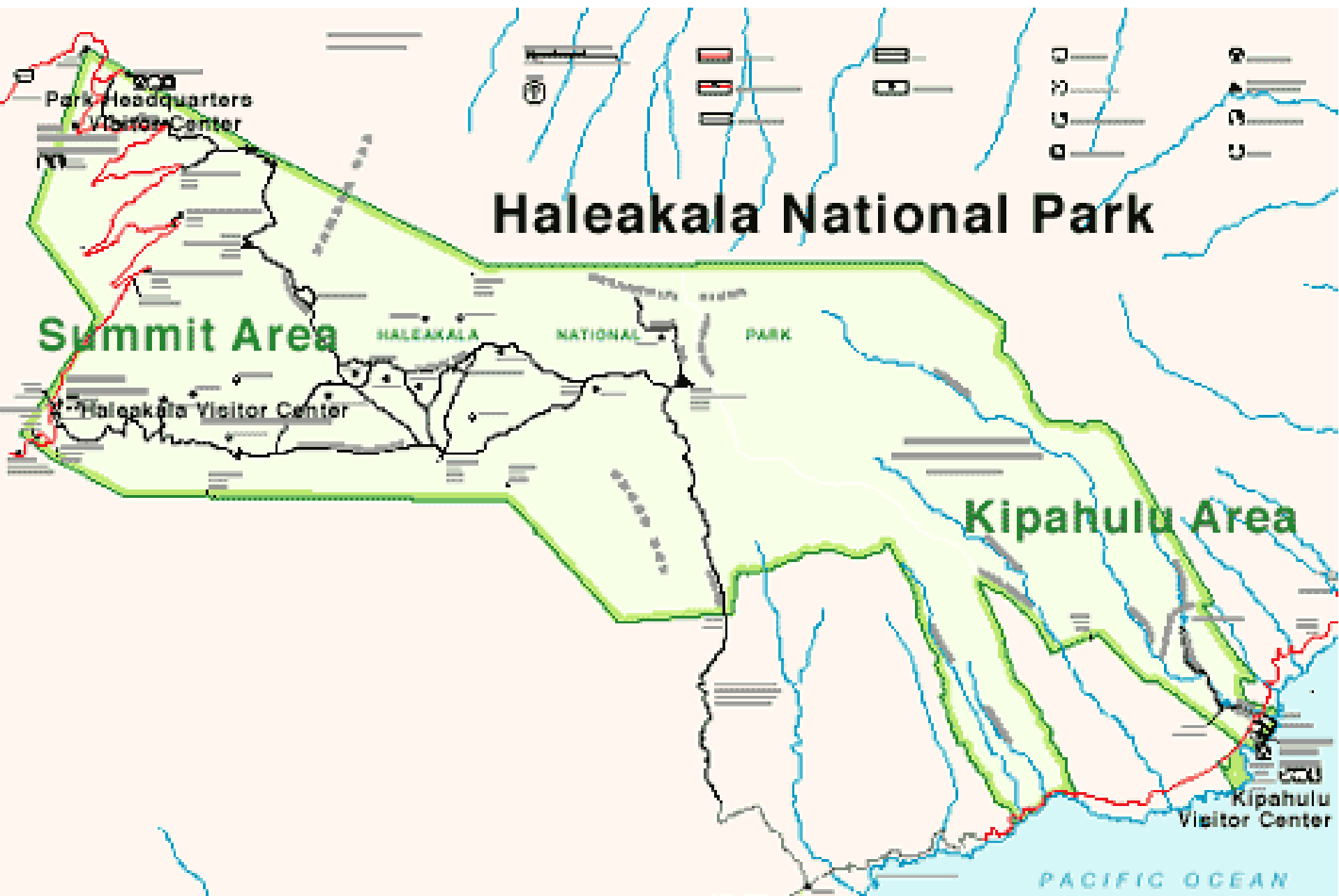
